



The Dragon's Tale *February 2012*

How do you really share the Christian faith with children? How do you teach them our Christian family history, the story of our salvation, and the love of God in Jesus Christ, working in us by the power of the Holy Spirit? How do you communicate that to children aged three to seven so they'll remember it and celebrate it?

You make religious instruction a daily feature of life, and you gather for chapel.

Both St. George's School and St. George's Preschool have chapel services each month school is in session. What we do in chapel is a reinforcement of what is taught by the teachers in the classrooms. We learn our story and celebrate God's presence with us in Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit. And we have fun.

St. George's School chapel meets weekly in the side chapel of the main sanctuary. We also call it the children's chapel because there's a nice rug to sit on and an icon of Christ and the children to focus on and remember that Jesus loves children. With Miss Phyllis and sometimes Miss Sheray, Miss Sandy, Miss Sue or Miss Jacquie, we process in behind a cross carried by one of the students and gather in the children's chapel. We pray, we sing, and we learn from the Bible stories. More often than not the stories are what I call "help me stories" where the students act out the story and learn in the process. The best "help me story" was our telling of Easter when one student who was placed in a "tomb" disappeared and was found on the other side of the church in "Galilee". One student who played one of the women at the tomb watched the "angel" remove the "stone" and shouted, "He's not there!" The look of amazement on her face grew as she shouted again, "No, really...he's not there!" Truly, he wasn't. Ask me sometime how we did it. It's a great story!

St. George's Preschool chapel meets monthly in the main sanctuary and the children's chapel. Miss Carly, Miss Anna, Miss Kristyn, Miss Honey, Miss Carol and Miss Trish lead their classes in and settle them either on the altar rail kneelers or in the children's chapel on the rug. Where we go depends on the size of the class attending. Parents, siblings and grandparents have been attending the four year old's chapel for a few years, and with attendance averaging seventy-five children and adults, we need to be in the main sanctuary. Other classes gather in the children's chapel because we're generally teachers and children only. The teachers have worked with the children on the chapel theme for the month. Miss Carol teaches everyone the music for when we gather.

On chapel days, the teachers lead the students into the worship space, get them settled and begin with the chapel song. Then I tell them a story about the theme, we sing, we say a prayer, and then we sing a goodbye song since chapel is at the end of their day. This year, Miss Carly tried something new. She invited the parents, siblings and grandparents of both the three year olds and four year olds to our Christmas chapel services. Including the preschool students, there were two hundred and fifty of us spread out over those three chapel services held in the main sanctuary.

The Preschool began the year with eighty three registered students and as I write this, there are ninety two students currently registered and attending. Inquiries about the Preschool program come in daily and parents and children come to visit and see for themselves.

They meet with Miss Carly and the teachers and are very impressed with the preschool program here at St. George's. They're also surprised at the presence of our K-1 school (hopefully to be K-2 in September) and are asking about multiple enrollments for their children.

The Directress of the Preschool, Carly Dowd, and the Founding Head of School, Phyllis Aldrich, along with their teachers and staff are to be commended for their vision and hard work in making the educational outreach to children such a success for the Gospel. They all bless us!

At one Preschool Christmas chapel, I told the Christmas story using the figures from the children's chapel nativity set. I knew we were pressed for time so I went quickly. When I finished, one little boy yelled out, "Is that it?" Everyone laughed. "Yep, that's it" I said.

But really, there's more, so much more....remember to say your prayers. Fr. Henry

Haiti Update

In March 2012, I will be returning to Haiti for my third trip since the earthquake hit in January 2009. This trip will be slightly different as I will be leading a team of engineers and scientist to our partner church of St. Philippe and St. Jacques in Corosse. The mission of this trip will be to begin construction of the water project and install solar panels to bring the first electricity to the school. At my company, AECOM, we have been doing fund raising to support this project and raised over \$11,000. This will go to purchase the piping and concrete for the water project and solar panels and batteries along with paying for the labor to construct and install the systems. Our team will leave on Wednesday March 14 and return Tuesday March 20. Please keep us in your prayers as we travel and do God's work.

Simultaneously, St. George's is also continuing to support the school of St. Philippe and St. Jacques. The school has between 60 and 120 children and we have been paying for the 5 teacher's salaries (\$5 per day per teacher). If you feel called to support this work, please make a check out to St. George's and in the subject line put Haiti Fund. We have also received a donation to purchase 20 bibles (in French Creole), 20 books of common prayer (French) and 20 hymnals to give to the church as a gift from St. George's. Hopefully labels can be made up to place in the inside covers stating who the books are from so the people will have a lasting memory. If someone is good at making labels, please let me know. What a gift these books will be.

Youth Group Mission Trip

The Youth Group has chosen to travel to Lynn, Massachusetts this summer for our Mission Trip. Preparations are underway and all are excited to go. We are in the process of planning some opportunities to share our plans with you all as well ways in which you can support us in our endeavors.

We continue to have our account at the bottle return center located in the Northern Lights Plaza on the corner of Routes 146 and 146A. Please just specify that your donation is for the St. George's Youth Group.

Who's who behind the scenes at St. George's?

How come we have a Fulbright scholar of American and English Literature cleaning the Randles Hallway and classrooms four nights a week?

Our Church and School are blessed with several devoted people who are rarely seen, but whose work shines all around us. And their gifts are many.

Meet one of this team: Oudou Sanogo who joined us in the spring of last year when he left a high profile position at a prestigious Language School in Bamako, Mali to accompany his wife, Melanie (Gulyas) Sanogo as she concluded a difficult, unsuccessful pregnancy. While waiting for his green card to be issued, he volunteered to help the Church by taking on evening cleaning responsibilities for Randles Hall. It gleams daily because of what he does for us at night.

Last month, he finally received his green card and is able to seek work more aligned with his professional training. He has begun translating and part time French teaching while he looks for more work. Meanwhile, he shows up nightly to polish our classroom wing so that both parents, students and visitors are impressed.

How did Oudou's long journey from his small native village of Ziena, in Mali, West Africa, begin? An education in this small, undeveloped country required hard work and sacrifice. Attending elementary school required a daily 4 mile walk. To attend grades 7-9 he had to leave his family and village to stay with distant relations far from home. He showed unusual skill in learning languages, having mastered not only his two native tribal languages but also French, the official language for all of Mali and Arabic. He won first place in his exams and gained admission to the best Lycee (high school) in the capital, Bamako. This was over 400 km from home. Graduating with highest honors, he attended two years of a teaching college in Bamako, specializing in the study of American culture and literature. He was noticed by the American Embassy and encouraged to apply for a Fulbright scholarship that would fund his university education in America. He was assigned to Hartwick College where he earned his degree in American studies. His thesis focused on the decline of the "American Dream" as shown in F. Scott Fitzgerald's *Great Gatsby*. And here at Hartwick College, he met his love, Melanie.

In 2008, he returned to work at a distinguished school in Bamako where he became the Assistant to the Administrator and designed programs to help local scholars to advance. He persuaded Melanie to come to Mali, where she worked first at the International School of Bamako and then at a nearby Kindergarten. They married in 2009.

Fast forward to today: he and Melanie live and work in Clifton Park. He is seeking ways to apply his training, and someday hopes to return to Mali to help its national economic development. For now, we continue to be blessed by his faithfulness to St. George's. As he is able to network with local French-speaking community groups, and pursue professional translation work, Oudou will be able to spread his gifts far beyond our Parish. We give thanks for his presence, and salute his perseverance and achievement.

When she died at the end of December, we lost a valiant spirit. Her son knew of her love for the school and asked that instead of flowers, people could send donations to the school. Her spirit is watching over us.

Love has definitely shone around us in many ways this month with generous donations of time, talent and treasure from our Parish and beyond. For example: although our limited budget that cannot fund field trips this year, ‘field trips’ have come to us! The Tang Teaching Museum at Skidmore College offered to bring us a “traveling art workshop once a month, with their expert art teacher. We are very happy to announce that several of St. George’s current preschoolers have enrolled for next fall. Please help us spread the word.

Lastly, it is time for the Parish, Pre-school and School to collaborate on producing a sequel to the famed Dragon’s Fare cookbook. Outreach in the Dominican Republic

The Dominican Republic Ecumenical Mission is planning its Fourteenth Medical/Spiritual Mission to San Pedro de Marcoris in the Dominican Republic. This Mission is based out of St. Eustace Church in Lake Placid and is one of several in the Diocese of Albany. The medical team will plan to see about 1000 patients during our short stay in the Dominican Republic. Seeing this many patients means we will need an enormous amount of supplies and medications. The 2012 trip dates have been set. They are February 24th-March 4th.

We are now asking for your help in securing the following donations of **personal care items including:** shampoo, conditioner, toothbrushes, toothpaste and washcloths. There is a container for donations in the narthex.

Also, we are seeking assistance with a non-monetary donation for the Prescribing Prevention Potable Water Project. What we really need are wine box spigots. One hundred and sixty spigots were collected, but we need 300. So, do the math, and beat the bushes to find 140 more spigots. Isn't this a nice way to donate to a worthy cause. There is a container for donations in the narthex.

While the team members pay their own way (\$1,400.00 per person) there is still a large need for monetary donations to help cover such expenses as medications that must be purchased in the Dominican Republic (\$3,000.00 - \$4,000.00). 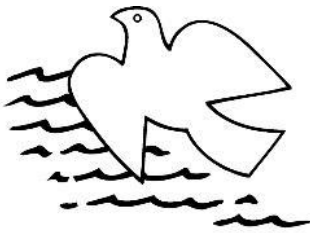

The other four Co-directors, part of over seventy volunteer staff, and the client families served from the Shenendehowa and Burnt Hills/Ballston Lake School Districts, join me to thank you for your very generous donation in December to the Food Pantry.

As we begin our 40th year of continuous operation, the Pantry depends upon contributors such as you to keep this outreach to the less fortunate continuing weekly throughout the year. Especially, in these difficult economic times, we appreciate your wonderful, caring support. We are currently serving more than 200 family units a month.

Thank you for helping to make a difference in the lives of these needy families that we may serve them with kindness and dignity. Because of wonderful donors, such as you, we are there for them to try to make their lives a little brighter.
